

How Do I Know if I Have a Conviction?

If you have ever been arrested or convicted of a crime, it could impact whether an immigration judge will order your deportation or grant you a bond. But sometimes, you must have been convicted of a crime for your criminal case to impact your immigration case.

When the immigration laws talk about a **conviction**, they mean:



A formal judgment of guilt entered by the court

OR

A plea of guilty or nolo contendere

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Some form of punishment



EXAMPLES CONVICTION NOT CONVICTION -Acquittal - Guilty verdict -Dismissal - Guilty plea + payment of fine or other punishment -Vacated (for constitutional or statutory - Nolo contendere plea + payment of fine or other punishment defect) -Diversionary programs that involve a formal plea, admission of guilt, -Juvenile delinquency and/or punishment -Diversionary programs that do not -Expungement involve formal plea, punishment, or -Withdrawal (for any reason other than a constitutional or statutory admission of guilt defect)

-Vacated (for any reason other than a constitutional or statutory defect)

-Withdrawal (for constitutional or statutory defect)
